The past few years of pandemic living have presented unique challenges for everyone. One of the biggest collective learnings we had as a society was the absolute necessity we have as a species to connect in a meaningful way. We were creative during the lockdowns, doing online fitness classes, and having Zoom chats and meetings. This was an excellent option given the circumstances. But, as time went on, a fatigue set in, for me, and many others. I missed seeing people - in person. All the small talk we do on the sides of events is lost, and some things just don't transfer to the screen. In my work as the Community Engagement Lead with StFX Service Learning, I felt this missing connection, and so did the students. They were hungry for community connection. Fortunately, around this time, communitu partners started welcomina students in person again, and placements with L'Ache were again a possibility.

The Service-Learning staff relationship with L'Arche is strong; a foundation built over years of collaboration and collective joy. But what about the students who had experienced a L'Arche placement in previous years? What had they taken away from the experience? I sent out a mass email, not sure what I would get in return, but almost immediately, I started receiving incredible, moving responses from former L'Arche Service-Learning students. They told me how powerful the L'Arche experience was for them, and how it has continued to influence their actions, choices, and career paths after graduation. Many still think about the core members they worked with daily.



The goal of Service-Learning is for community partners and students to build a reciprocal relationship. Every single student who replied clearly described a reciprocal and often transformational relationship with L'Arche and the people there. This is theu met building community. In a time where so much is dividing people, in a time where many of isolation us choose by constantly checking our phones instead of engaging with those around us. L'Arche Core Members and staff show the students the joy of building community and the importance of listening to everyone's voice in a non-judgmental way. It is testimonials like these that bring joy to my heart and make my job meaningful. It is not an understatement to say that a placement with L'Arche can change someone's life. I look forward to seeing the results of the synergy created by L'Arche and Service Learning in the years to come.

I like to dance, drum, weave and paint. I like it. I'm happy when I paint. I think of water and waves when I paint. It feels goo that people see my art.










Regis MacDonald
